

## **Total Nonfarm Jobs**


January 1996 – October 2012 Mississippi








## Uninsured by state, population under 65 years old

# **Medicaid Expansion Target Population**

- Newly eligible would be adults that earn too much to qualify for Medicaid, but too little to qualify for subsidy to purchase insurance in the exchange.
  - Example: Adults in a family of four earning wages between approximately \$11,000 and \$30,000



Between 40% and 43%


Between 43% and 46%
